TECHNOLOGY ADVANCES

Head Librarian - Bruce Seidman

We still have library users come up to us at the Information Desk and ask for the card catalog. The answer to this question brings to the forefront just how much the information boom has affected us in the last eleven years since the infamous date of 1/17/94 at 4:31 AM. It was Martin Luther King's birthday and I was sound asleep dreaming of the nice day off ahead of me when it hit. After securing my own home I went to check on my parents who lived in an apartment in an area in Sherman Oaks that looked like World War Three broke out. After driving from my house in West Hills to Sherman Oaks, my next stop was to find out how the Chatsworth Library had fared. I was the first person to enter the library after the earthquake. The old Chatsworth Library built in 1963 was not subject to the more stringent building codes that our new library had to follow. For example the book shelves are now bolted into the ground where they were pretty much free standing in the old building. Consequently all the book shelves came down like dominoes. Mountains of books were scattered every which way. The ceiling lights which were also not secured either had fallen or were hanging loose and parts of the ceiling had fallen leaving a plume of who knows what floating in the air. In addition the card catalog furniture had tipped over and all the drawers had fallen onto the floor leaving thousands and thousands of cards in the worst ever game of 52 pickup. I took a deep sigh as I dreaded having to pick them up and refile them.

Enough damage was sustained that the Chatsworth Branch did not reopen until July of 1994. During that seven month period the Los Angeles Public Library entered the computer age. We were told to throw out all the catalog cards (WHAT A RELIEF), books were barcoded, and patrons traded in their paper library cards for plastic ones. Unlike the card catalog which only reflected what was in this branch and even then not very accurately since maintenance was very tedious, now Central Library and the seventy one branches are all linked and patrons now have access to millions of books most of which can easily be inter library loaned. The library department now moves 40,000 books a day around the system equivalent to moving an average branch library everyday. It was also during that period that Los Angeles Public Library became a leader in introducing the public to the internet.

Before the vast majority of people had any clue what the internet was we became part of a state library project that put us in the forefront. Before the World Wide Web was even in existence and everything was text based. I was given two computers and a training class. I was also asked to choose a community partner to help bring the community into this new age. I chose retired engineer and Friends member Keith Watts who worked closely with me on this project for the next several Keith became the vears. internet community guru and many Chatsworth people turned to him for help getting launched into cyberspace. Keith along with his late wife Sheila have always been very special and dedicated friends of our library.

Throughout the entire planning and building phases of our library Keith Watts has served as our Friends President and has been a great leader in helping to get this library built. Keith also kept our Friends Group together during the long process of bringing the new library to fruition. I was very happy that the Friends have nominated Keith Watts for a Chatsworth Community Service Award to be given out at the Chatsworth Coordinating Council Banquet in May.
